State Senate in 2010. He was elected President pro Tempore in June 2014, the first Latino to hold that position in more than 130 years. Prior to holding elective office, Senator de León was an educator and community organizer,

Senator de León's legislative agenda has consistently championed the environment and environmental issues. As a freshman assemblymember, Senator de León authored Assembly Bill 31, which allocated park bond funding for new parks and recreational facilities in underserved communities, resulting in 126 park projects throughout California. De León has been a leader in the development of the Los Angeles State Historic Park. In the Senate he authored Senate Bill 783 in 2013 to raise visibility for investment in local, regional, and state park infrastructure.

In 2012, Senator de León co-chaired Proposition 39, the California Clean Energy Jobs Act, convincing voters to close a corporate tax loophole that generates billions of dollars to fund more than 40,000 California jobs to improve energy efficiency and expand clean energy generation in schools.

This year, Senator de León introduced SB 350, which will increase California's renewable energy mix to 50 percent and double the energy efficiency of existing buildings, both by 2030. The provisions will combat dirty air and fight climate change and create a cleaner electric energy grid. Federation President Marian Dodge was on hand to witness Governor Brown sign SB 350 into law at Griffith Park in October. Senator de León also introduced a bill to require public employee pension funds to divest from coal and to increase the state's climate pollution reduction target to 80 percent below 1990 levels by 2050.

## Los Angeles Department of Building and Safety Introduces Smartphone LADBS Go App

LA's Department of Building and Safety introduced a smartphone app for iPhone and Android. The app will provide important LADBS Service Center information including locations, directions, and hours of operation.



The app will also provide wait times so that visits to the service counters can be optimized. App users can check out permit information a n d status, clearances, and

pending inspections. LADBS Go also allows builders of in-progress projects to call for inspections. Perhaps most important for community members and advocates, the app allows potential violations to be reported, including the option to include a smartphone photo of the alleged violation.

## **City Planning Schedules Hearings for Proposed BHO / BMO Updates**

The Department of City Planning's proposed amendments to the Baseline Hillside Ordinance (BHO) and Baseline Mansionization Ordinance (BMO) have been scheduled for public hearings. Two hearings occurred on December 2nd and 3rd. The remaining two are scheduled for December 15th (at Ronald F. Deaton Civic Auditorium, 100 W First Street) and December 16th (Marvin Braude Constituent Service Center, Conference Rooms 1a & 1b, 6262 Van Nuys Boulevard). Both run from 7:00-9:00 p.m.

The code amendments would establish new regulations for properties already subject to the BHO and BMO. In general, the amendments would remove numerous loopholes that caused the existing code to be ineffective in protecting single-family residential neighborhoods from out-of-scale development.

The purpose of the hearings is to obtain testimony from affected and interested persons before Planning makes its recommendation to the City Planning Commission. Many of our member organizations are impacted by one or both of these amendments. We encourage you to learn more about the proposed amendments and provide your feedback to the City Planning Department.

### NPS Confirms Death of Mountain Lion Due to Rodenticide Poisoning

The National Park Service confirmed on November 11 that the death of the mountain lion designated as P-34 was due to ingestion of rat poison. P-34 was the first mountain lion since 2004 to be conclusively shown to have died from rodenticide exposure, according to an article published in the Los Angeles Times. NPS Wildlife Ecologist Seth Riley reported that P-34 had been exposed to five anti-rodenticide compounds.

Second generation anti-coagulant rodenticides were banned for use by members of the public in July 2014. Farmers and pestcontrol companies are still permitted to use them. Jonathan Evans, the environmental health legal director for the Center for Biological Diversity, an Oakland nonprofit, says that recent wildlife deaths demonstrate that more rodenticides need to be banned and alternative pest control measures adopted.
