Great American Outdoors Act Moves Forward

In a time when much of the news has been bleak, we finally have some good news. The Senate, with rare bipartisan support, passed the Great American Outdoors Act by 73 - 25 in June. It goes to the House next week. The bill includes billions of dollars to purchase property and do maintenance on existing public lands. The funding, which comes primarily from fees for oil and gas drilling, would benefit not only national parks but parks and green space in cities such as Los Angeles. \$900 million will go to the Land & Water Conservation Fund. June 16, 2020 Via video conference Draft Minutes

I. Call to Order

President Charley Mims called the meeting to order at 7:02 pm.

Guest: Fernando Morales, District Director Sheila Kuehl's Office

Fernando gave an update on COVID-19 in LA County.

SB 902: The bill formerly had an exemption for Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones. The supervisor wrote a letter advocating for that exemption to be restored. She passed a motion, at the county level, making sure that there is not additional density within our VHFHS zones. Fernando to send the letter to HF.

<u>Guest: Seamus Garrity,</u> Sr Field Rep State Assemblymember Friedman

AB 3279: The assemblymember is in regular conversation with environmental groups to ensure we are not undercutting the environmental community. She wants to have a meeting with HF leadership to discuss our concerns about AB 3279 and any other legislation that her office is dealing with regarding natural resources.

<u>Guest: Vickere Murphy,</u> Sr District Rep Senator Portantino

The state budget was passed.

Senate is heavily focused on COVID-19 bills. Some bills currently held in the suspense file may be released June 18.

II. Approval of minutes - Julie Kremkus

The May Minutes were approved as written.

III. Officers' Reports

A. President's Report – Charley Mims

Local member organizations should take the lead on projects and submit Requests for Action.

A letter was submitted in response to the DEIR on Sidewalk Repair program consistent with the position we took in the past. The proposed program especially impacts the Protected Tree Ordinance in hillside areas.

Sullivan Canyon Project: John Given gave the report regarding the removal of three additional protected trees that were not permitted. The trees were substantial and the developer did it knowingly, in violation of the ordinance. The city then pulled all their permits for the entire job and there was a potential due process problem and ended up being litigated by the developer. At California Courts, the judge gave them back their permits, then the city appealed. The applicant (developer) offered a confidential settlement to the city. It went to City Council and many community groups opposed including the HF. It's continued until tomorrow morning. It's a closed session but they will take public comment. Anyone can attend the meeting to oppose a settlement that would trade permits for dismissal. If the city agrees to the settlement, it sets a precedent that a developer can illegally remove protected trees. They can sue the city and the city will fold. The enforcement process then is virtually ineffective. HF executive committee took action last week to oppose settlement on that basis.

B. <u>Treasurer's Report</u> – Don Andres

All bills paid; there are no outstanding expenses. Expenses are reduced due COVID-19 and not having to pay for a meeting room All 44 members have paid dues for 2020.

IV. Old Business

A. Hollywood Center (AKA Millennium Project)

ENV-2018-2116-EIR. Mary Ledding gave an update. Alexa Iles Skarpelos from Hollywood Dell Civic Association was responsible for the massive letter they put together. Additionally Robert Silverstein submitted a massive letter

(over 1000 pages), engaged experts, talked about the voting corruption. It was suggested to have Robert speak on the status at the next meeting. Final EIR is supposed to come out at the end of July. The project lacks affordable housing. Impacts on traffic were not addressed for the Argyle and Franklin intersection. Caltrans studies were not included. Several areas of analysis were not included such as the on ramp at Franklin. Stephen Krawchuk discussed how four HOAs are effected by this project and that the actions of the city sets a bad precedent. There was a discussion on the timing of when to take a position. Everything is in the preliminary stage right now. When the EIR is final, the HF will take a position and respond. Comments from the HF that were already submitted can be viewed on the website.

V. New Business

<u>A. CA housing legislation: SB 902, SB 995, SB 1120, SB 1299, SB 1385</u>

Wendy-Sue Rosen suggested sending the same letter for all bills about the HF policy addressing fire safety and densification in hillside areas. She said she would draft it with the help of John Given. There was discussion that affordable housing should be addressed for each individual bill.

MOTION: Wendy-Sue Rosen and John Given to draft a letter opposing all the bills unless they have an exclusion for Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones. The motion passed.

B. AB 3279 CEQA attack - John Given

This item was tabled as Seamus Garrity, State Assemblymember Friedman's Sr Field Rep offered a meeting with Friedman.

VI. Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 8:58 pm. Next meeting via Zoom: on July 21, 2020.

The Importance of Trees to Birds

The Federation has long been fighting for a strong and meaningful Protected Tree Ordinance. We are trying to get important native trees such as toyon and Mexican elderberry added to the list to preserve smaller but equally valuable native trees. When other programs such as the Sidewalk Repair Program undermine the Protected Tree Ordinance, we fight back and do our best to preserve trees.

The San Fernando Valley Audubon Society hosted a webinar on the importance of trees especially street trees – to birds. The presentation was made by Dr. Eric Wood, a specialist in urban ecology, life-long birder, and now a professor at Cal State LA.

Eric gives a brief history of the development of the urban tree canopy and how it follows economic patterns. Affluent areas have higher density of trees, trees of larger diameters, and more feeding birds. LA is famous for winter migratory birds; however many birds are in decline.

Most street trees are non-native. Birds prefer native trees like California sycamore and Coast live oak. They don't prefer camphor, crepe myrtle, or London plane tree.

We should encourage street tree planting, especially in disadvantaged areas. Cities should have incentives to keep trees alive. Be cautious

about planting all the same trees because disease could wipe them all out; we need diversity of trees
