## Dear Commissioners:

The Federation of Hillside and Canyon Associations, Inc., founded in 1952, represents 44 homeowner and residents associations spanning the Santa Monica Mountains, from Pacific Palisades to Mt. Washington. The Federation's mission is to protect the property and quality of life of its over 200,000 constituents and to conserve the natural habitat and appearance of the hillside and mountain areas in which they live. We are writing to express concern that the Staff Report for the "re:code LA" project, especially the four recommendations and 30 concepts, are far too vague to assure the necessary balance between development interests and hillside and community protection concerns.

The Four Recommendations focus on development interests without any language indicating that facilitation of development will be tempered by an equally strong policy to protect community quality of life and protect the Santa Monica Mountains' natural hillside resources. The 30 concepts also suggest that development interests will trump community and hillside protection. The statement that design standards should be streamlined implies the elimination or reduction of procedural protections relied upon by the community to protect quality of life and hillside preservation. Similarly, the policy favoring the modification of density requirements for more "flexibility" would seem to authorize looser, less reliable density requirements, which could have significantly adverse community and hillside impacts. While the concepts do include the recognition that priorities for future development should include neighborhood preservation and conformity issues, there is no guidance for applying that concept. There is nothing clearly stating that future growth should not be at the expense of the City's neighborhoods. And there is no mention at all of the Santa Monica Mountains or a policy to protect and preserve the natural integrity of the Mountains for future generations.

We therefore ask that the Commission include stronger, more direct language clarifying that future development cannot be at the expense of community and that protection of the Santa Monica Mountains is a priority.
